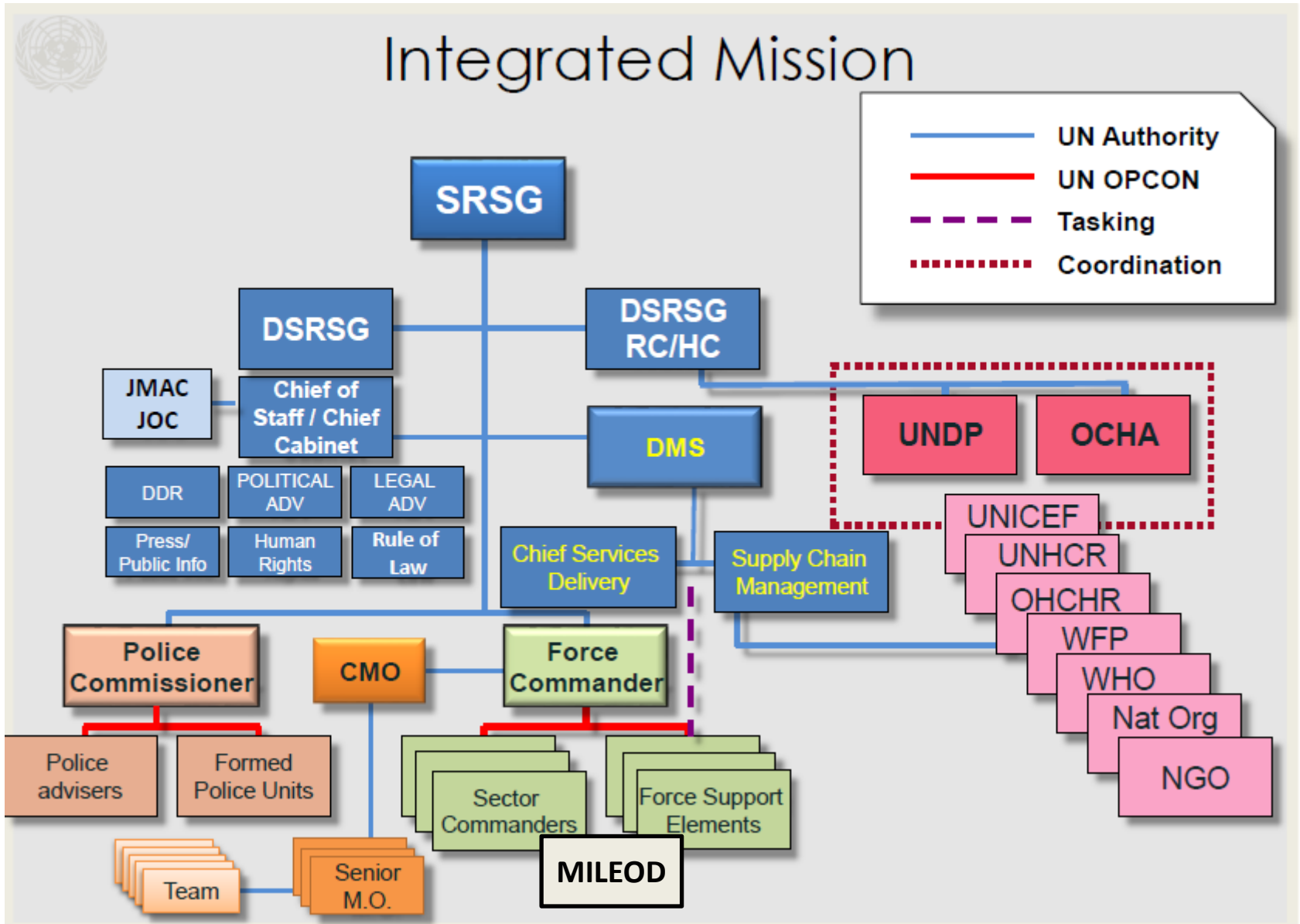
Sustainment Coordinator

- Maintain accounting of personnel and equipment
- Maintains required on-hand supplies
- Forecast requirements
- Ensures equipment , vehicles, tents maintained
- Communicate unit readiness and requirements
- Request logistical and administrative support to National Logistics System, UN DMS/CMS

Self-Sustainment

- Self sustainment requirements:
 - UN-TCC Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
 - Contingent Owned Equipment (COE)
 - Statement of Unit Requirement
- Initial self sustainment period:
 - Rations, water, petrol, oil, shelter
 - First 30 to 90 days
 - Defined in MOU or LOA
- Primary support provided through national sources

MILEOD Support Cell

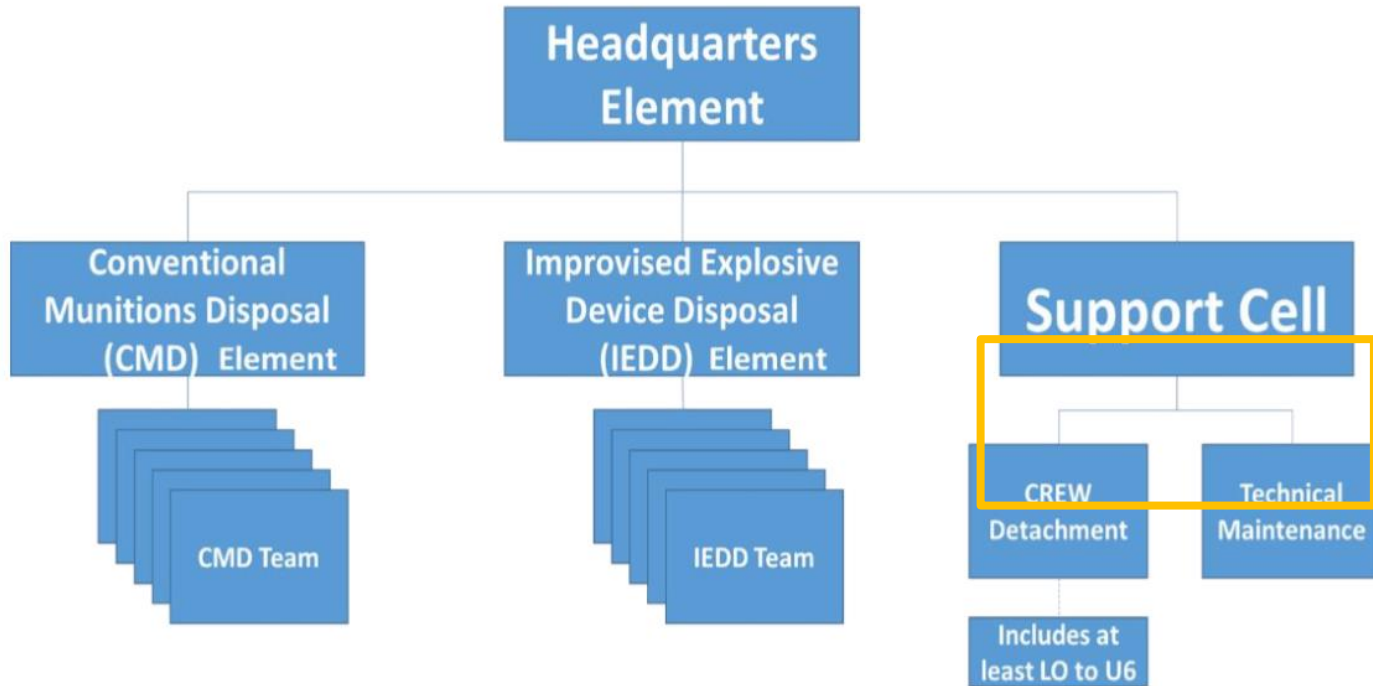


Figure 3-1 A generic UN military EOD unit structure containing a HQ element with CMD, IEDD and support cell components.

Lesson 3.5 Take Away

- The TCC is ultimately responsible for readiness and sustainment of the MILEOD
- The MILEOD generally expected to deploy self-sufficient for up to 90 days in accordance with SUR and MOU
- MILEOD Staff Technical Advisor coordinating external support for the unit
- The DMS/CMS is responsible for support to the entire missions and has routine tasking authority for enabling units (Rarely Exercised for MILEOD)
